The Ontario Bird Records Committee has nominated the following two persons to serve for the years 1985-1987:

Kevin McLaughlin

Kevin is known to a great many Ontario birders as he takes two weeks of vacation at Point Peles each May. In addition, they have rushed to Hamilton to see his excellent finds such as Arctic Loon, N. Gannet, Fulvuous Whistling Duck and Tufted Duck. Kevin has been birding for only 10 years which is surprising given his acknowledged expertise. He specializes in gull and shorebird ageing and identification; one has only to listen to him or read his meticulous accounts to appreciate his penchant for detailed descriptions. He is <u>American Birds</u> sub-regional editor for Hamilton and serves on the Hamilton Bird Records Committee which has just produced a <u>Date Guide to the Birds of</u> the Hamilton Area. Kevin is a bachelor who works for Union Gas in civilian life.

Ron Pittaway

Ron has been watching birds for "at least 27 years". He is one of that group of dynamic Ottawa birders who burst on the Ontario scene almost 20 years ago and was, in fact, a founding member of the Ottawa Bird Records Committee. Ron has written extensively in Trail and Landscape, The Canadian Field Naturalist, the Ontario Field Biologist and other publications on bird and mammal subjects. His enthusiasm for birds and bird identification is known to hundreds of Ontario bird watchers. Ron teaches outdoor education at the Leslie Fros t Centre in Dorset and lives with his wife in Minden. 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THE O.F.O. FIELD TRIP TO RAINY RIVER/LAKE-OF-THE-WOODS 26-31 MAY 1984

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The Rainy River area is a neglected part of Ontario ornithologically. Any trip to this area can yield valuable information on the more common breeding birds, as well as on vagrants and the western specialties known to occur here. A total of 8 members participated in this field trip to the westernmost corner of Ontario. Over the span of 6 days, a total of 162 species were seen and/or heard. We covered a wide variety of habitats on the clay plain along Rainy River and in the vicinity of the southeastern end of Lake-of-the-Woods. Hardwood forests, second-growth woods, sedge meadows, sloughs, dunes, shorelines, rural land, willow thickets, and coniferous woods were all visited. The early days of the trip were characterized by the presence of numerous migrant thrushes and warblers. Later in the trip, many of the later migrants, such as Mourning and Connecticut Warblers, Olive-sided Flycatcher, and Scarlet Tanager appeared. Most of the nesting blackbirds (including both species of meadowlark, Brewer's Blackbird, and Yellow-headed Blackbird) were already on territory when we arrived. Other species which were regularly encountered in the area included White Pelican, Bald Eagle, Wilson's Phalarope (150+), Sedge Wren, LeConte's Sparrow, and Clay-colored Sparrow. In addition to the species mentioned above, some of the western and northern specialties encountered were Merlin, Sharp-tailed Grouse (lek), Sandhill Crane (4+), Yellow Rail (heard), Marbled Godwit, Franklin's Gull, Great Gray Owl (4), Gray Jay (family group), and Black-billed Magpie (7). Most amazing of all was a full-plumaged male Western Tanager in full song at Windy Point on the southeast shore of Lake-of-the-Woods, on 30 May.

A substantial amount of data was also gathered for the Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas while we were in the area. Some of the species nearing their limits of distribution or otherwise rare in northern Ontario which were recorded on the trip were Green-backed Heron (2nd record for northern Ontario), Willow Flycatcher, Northern Mockingbird, Yellow-throated Vireo, and Golden-winged Warbler. All in all, I think everyone who participated in this trip had a rewarding experience. I hope these highlites will stimulate others to bird this poorly known portion of Ontario.
